Physician-Directed Services

Our board certified Medical Director works with our interdisciplinary team to create and review an individualized plan of care for each patient.

Skilled Nursing

Skilled Nurses and the attending Physician work together to provide a plan of care that helps manage pain and physical symptoms while providing needed medications, supplies and equipment. Comfort and dignity are enhanced during end-of-life moments.

Home Health Aides

CNAs and HHAs are trained, certified health care workers who provide assistance in the home with personal care (hygiene and exercise) or light household duties (meal preparation and cleaning), and monitoring the patient's condition. VNA's Certified Dementia Care Aides provide specialized care to make sure patients with dementia receive the highest quality of care.

Social Work

Our Social Workers provide emotional support and counseling, as well as assistance with financial matters for patients and their families.

Volunteer Care

Caring volunteers provide respite services by engaging the patient in a variety of circumstance-appropriate activities, allowing the family or caregiver time for errands and other personal matters.

Bereavement Care

Compassionate care continues after the patient has passed. Comprehensive emotional and spiritual support is offered through grief therapy and guidance to family members and caregivers on both an individual and group basis.

We Honor Veterans

Visiting Nurses is proud to partner with We Honor Veterans, a collaborative awareness campaign through the National Hospice and Palliative Care organization and the Department of Veterans Affairs which identifies patients with military experience and honors them through formal acknowledgment ceremonies.



CareLink™

This electronic relay device allows the in-home client to signal for help in an emergency by pushing a button located on a pendant.

Who Pays for Hospice Care?

Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurance companies typically pay for the following:

- 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week on-call care and support
- Physician-directed services and nursing care
- Medical supplies and equipment
- Pharmaceuticals for pain relief and symptom management
- Physical, Occupational, Speech and Respiratory Therapy
- Continuous in-home care at home during periods of crisis
- Authorized inpatient care
- Social services
- Spiritual and emotional counseling
- Bereavement services
